

THE PATH TO SOCIAL **JUSTICE**

The Preamble of the Constitution of India reads, "We, The People of India, having solemnly resolved to constitute India into a Sovereign Socialist Secular Democratic Republic and to secure all its citizens: Justice, social, economic and political...



The Constitution of India promises us, the citizens of India, social justice, but have we reached the goal yet?

Social justice refers to equality, meaning all citizens are equal and have to be treated equally without any bias based on colour, religion, caste, sex, economic background, and so on. It also means no person will be given any special privilege or status.

Social justice could have different definitions, but the essence remains the same: Inclusion and fairness.

▶ EQUITY

It denotes that every citizen should get equal access to resources specific to their needs and that they should get the opportunities they need to attain their goals in life, and thus lead happier and more peaceful lives. It also means that resources should be distributed as per the requirements of people. To ensure equity, there should be policies to address the past hindrances people faced in accessing resources. Thus, equity is essential for equality.

▶ DIVERSITY

India's strength lies in unity in diversity, but when it comes to social justice, diversity is not often represented well. It is important to promote diversity in different settings, be it educational, employment, government, or social sectors. Women, minority communities, people with disabilities, indigenous communities, and others need representation at all levels to attain an equal society as well as to ensure inclusion in society.



THERE ARE FIVE MAIN **PRINCIPLES THAT CONSTITUTE SOCIAL JUSTICE.**

► HUMAN RIGHTS

The most fundamental principle of social justice is human rights. Human rights and social justice are interrelated, and without human rights, there cannot be social justice. Human rights refer to rights inherent to all human beings, regardless of class, caste, region, religion, colour, creed, or sex. The right to life, freedom of expression, the right to education and livelihood, the right to dignity, the right to peace and safety, and more, are human rights. The guarantee of human rights assures equality, justice, respect, and freedom.

▶ ACCESS TO RESOURCES

Equal access to resources such as healthcare, food, housing, education, and more is essential to ensuring social justice in society. Even today, lakhs of people in India continue to suffer denial of resources. For different socioeconomic groups, equal access to resources helps them get an equal start in life.

▶ PARTICIPATION

Participation refers to the principle that every individual in society, especially those from marginalised groups, gets their voice heard. We often see that public policies are set by a few, but with the inclusion of every section of society in such processes, the vision of a just society could become a reality.

THE CHALLENGES AHEAD

Even today, poverty, illiteracy, ignorance, and lack of access to basic facilities such as food, shelter, drinking water, electricity, and more, are plaguing our society. How can social justice be a reality when these issues are still prevalent?

Age-old biases against certain classes and sections promote discrimination. When crores of people are pushed into oblivion and suffer in silence, how is social justice possible?

To ensure social justice, the priority should be adhering to the five principles of social justice listed above. Equality is possible if there is equity and equal access to resources. Education is a human right, and governments need to ensure that every child and every citizen is educated and that they are able to pursue education without any obstacles. For this to happen, discrimination based on caste, class, religion, and sex needs to be addressed and eradicated.

India is progressing, no doubt, but only when the fruits of progress reach every corner of the country can we boast of progress. When every citizen of India enjoys a safe, healthy, happy, peaceful, and dignified life, there could be the possibility of social justice. To make this vision a reality, everyone has to contribute, from the government to you and us! Striving for social justice is definitely worth it because it prevents deprivations arising from social prejudice and guarantees the essentials of a better life to every citizen.

DR. B. R. AMBEDKAR - THE LIFE

Born on April 14, 1891, in Mhow (now known as Ambedkar Nagar).



WHAT HE SUFFERED

He was born into the 'Mahar' caste, then called untouchables, who suffered extreme social discrimination. At every step of his life, he faced brutal discrimination. He could not sit with the other children in his class. He could not even drink water on his own, as he was not allowed to touch anything. Even when he secured high offices in the government, he continued to suffer caste discrimination. This shows how deeply rooted the cruel notion of untouchability was in India then. Poverty, lack of basic human rights, and obstacles in every step of his way—he persevered and paved his way through hard work, dedication, and the will to change societal laws that deprived human beings of their basic human rights.

WHAT HE ACHIEVED

Dr. Ambedkar realised way earlier in his life that only education could change his life.

- He was the first student from his caste to study at Elphinstone High School.
- He graduated with a degree in political science and economics from Bombay University in 1912.
- He studied at the prestigious Columbia University in the United States after receiving a scholarship from Sayajirao Gaekwad, the ruler of Baroda. He completed his MA from the university in 1915.
- He studied economics at the London School of Economics and enrolled to study law at Grey's Inn.
- He completed D. Sc. in Economics from the University of London in 1923.
- He received his Ph.D. in economics in 1927 from the University of Columbia.
- He led the Mahad Satyagraha in 1927 to assert the rights of Dalits to use water from a public tank in Mahad, Maharashtra.
- The Kalaram Temple Movement n 1930 secured the right of Dalits to enter Hindu temples.
- · He played a crucial role in the establishment of the Reserve Bank of India (RBI).
- He also served as the Labour Minister in the Viceroy's Executive Council from 1942 to 1946. He championed crucial labour reforms during his tenure.
- He was the chairman of the drafting committee of the Indian Constitution.
- · He became the first Minister of Law and Justice of Independent India.

A prolific author and scholar, Dr. Ambedkar authored many books. Some of them include 'The Annihilation of Caste, The Evolution of Provincial Finance in British India, Who Were the Shudras?, The Problem of the Rupee: Its Origin and its Solution, Castes in India: Their Mechanism, Genesis and Development, The Buddha and his Dhamma, Buddha or Karl Marx, among others.

HIS LEGACY

Dr. Ambedkar embraced Buddhism in a historic ceremony in Nagpur in 1956. It also resulted in a mass conversion of Dalits, giving them a new identity and hopes for a dignified future. Dr. Ambedkar passed away on December 6, 1956. He was 65. December 6 is observed as Mahaparinirvan Diwas across India. The nation remembers him every day as the "Father of the Indian Constitution!"

His writings, his philosophy, his guidance, and his message continue to be relevant, as he inspires millions even today. He showed us that hope for a better tomorrow starts with the first step of believing in oneself and marching towards it with perseverance, knowledge, determination, and confidence.

His life was not easy, and it continued to throw challenges at him till his death, but Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar focused on uplifting the marginalised and clearing the path for others to follow. He dedicated his life to eradicating caste discrimination. Dr. Ambedkar's teachings continue to be relevant, and he remains a beacon of hope and inspiration to every Indian.

ABC (Sterilisation & Vaccination) is crucial in dog population

Utkarsh ABC is unique. Apart from following the AWBI (Animal Welfare Board of India) guidelines, Utkarsh also undertakes the following procedures:

- Videography of the catching and releasing process to note and ensure the exact location
- 7-in-1 vaccination to the dogs at the time of admissions to prevent viral infections
- Complete blood examination of the dogs before surgery
- Tying reflective radium collars to the dogs on their release to protect them from road accidents at night


